Yesterday I attended my first meeting as a committee member of the Michigan DNR's Warmwater Resources Steering Committee. I was there to represent both the Michigan Ontario Muskie CLUB and the Lake St. Clair Guide Association. The main topic of the meeting was the proposed musky spearing season on Lake St Clair. The DNR presented substantial evidence that the musky population on Clair is down over the last several years and so are the catch rates. Despite this several large groups in Michigan such as Bass Nation, Michigan bowfisherman and DNR sports all agree with this proposal that the Michigan Dark house association proposed. It shocks me that these groups call for the support of musky clubs such as the MOMC, MMA and Muskie Inc when it comes to bass regulations, weed control or other central sportsmen topics and then when it comes to muskies they throw out the sportsman hat and side with something so nonsporting and devastating as spearing even when the evidence on the fisheries future isn't as strong as we would like. Please be prepared for our next major musky battle! We will need group participation and support to keep spearing off St Clair.

Rules & Regulations on reverse side

1. All participants agree to accept <u>ALL</u> decisions made by a three judge panel.

2. All boats must pass inspection, prior to tournament start. Boats will be inspected in the water, at the Detroit Yacht Club, from 5:00 - 6:15am. After inspection, the captain <u>IS</u> required to sign in for their crew, with the MOMC inspector, and pick up your fish tags. Teams <u>NOT</u> signed in or have <u>NOT</u> tagged their fish, will <u>NOT</u> be eligible to register their catch.

3. Shotgun start at 6:30am from DYC. Fishing hours are from tournament start until 1:30pm, April 29, 2018. All captains must be in line **AT** the official MOMC Weigh Station (DYC), no later than 2:00pm, with your five (5) tagged heaviest fish. Late arrivals will **NOT** be eligible to register their fish. <u>NO EXCEPTIONS</u>.

4. All fish must be caught between 6:30am and 1:30pm on April 29, 2018 to be eligible. Your fish must be fresh and tagged with the tags provided during inspection, in order to be entered. (Alive and breathing would be helpful!!) The three judge panel will determine the freshness of all fish turned in. We are promoting catch and release of any walleyes entered, if you are able to ensure a safe release please help grow the population.

5. Only one (1) angler limit of five **(5)** walleye will count towards your team's official registered catch. Culling **IS** permitted during fishing hours. Walleye must be 15" or longer to be eligible, in the interest of conservation & preservation.

6. All waters of the Detroit River are open for fishing, during the MOMC Spring Walleye Classic. Specific boundaries are waters West of the Lake St Clair 35ft Racon Light, and North of the Green D33 Channel Marker at the mouth of Lake Erie. (Yes – Sturgeon Hole is open to fishing!!!)

7. The amount of cash prize is dependent on the total number of entries, minus the total expense of the derby. The heaviest registered catch wins the grand prize. Pay outs for 1st, 2nd, & 3rd places will be awarded. The heaviest single walleye will be used as tie breaker for heaviest registered catch.

8. The Calcutta for the largest single walleye will be determined by WEIGHT. Tie breaker for the Calcutta will be determined by the longest length of the heaviest walleye.

9. Only legal means of angling may be used to harvest walleye, as identified by the MDNR & OMNR.

10. The tournament committee reserves the right to inspect and/or dissect any walleye which is suspected to have been fraudulently enhanced, by any method. Enhanced fish <u>WILL</u> result in immediate team disqualification, and loss of all entry fees.

11. <u>ALL</u> tournament participants must conduct themselves in an appropriate sportsmanlike manner, so as to bring a favorable impression on the MOMC & DYC. Failure to do so could result in disqualification from the tournament.

12. Protests must be written, signed and presented by the Team Captain, along with a \$100 "No BS" retainer. Protests received must be submitted no later than 15 minutes after closing of the scales. Retainer will be returned **IF** the protest is found to be valid. Otherwise, retainer becomes property of the MOMC general fund.

13. Any tournament participants found in violation of the above rules can be disqualified from the tournament.

NOTES:

MOMC Derby Control will monitor VHF - Channel 80.

Participants **ARE** allowed to have their legal limit of walleye, per angler, in possession. Please keep these separate from the five (5) fish you plan to enter.

All registered walleye will be fin clipped, after being weighed, to prevent trade offs.

In keeping with an era gone by, we believe, and you agree, to accept all liability for everything concerning you. Your crew accepts liability for themselves and the organizers accept responsibilities for nothing.

Heart Attack: First Aid

We are in the beginning stages of organizing a certified CPR and First Aid class that is American Heart Assoc. approved this Spring. We will keep you abreast of the time and date. This will count for USCG captain requirements and healthcare worker requirements.

Someone having a heart attack may experience any or all of the following:

- Uncomfortable pressure, fullness or squeezing pain in the center of the chest
- Discomfort or pain spreading beyond the chest to the shoulders, neck, jaw, teeth, or one or both arms, or occasionally upper abdomen
- Shortness of breath
- Lightheadedness, dizziness, fainting
- Sweating
- Nausea
- A heart attack generally causes chest pain for more than 15 minutes, but it can also have no symptoms at all. Many people who experience a heart attack have warning signs hours, days or weeks in advance.

What to do if you or someone else may be having a heart attack

- **Call 911 or your local medical emergency number.** Don't ignore or attempt to tough out the symptoms of a heart attack for more than five minutes. If you don't have access to emergency medical services, have a neighbor or a friend drive you to the nearest hospital. Drive yourself only as a last resort, and realize that it places you and others at risk when you drive under these circumstances.
- **Chew and swallow an aspirin,** unless you are allergic to aspirin or have been told by your doctor never to take aspirin. But seek emergency help first, such as calling 911.
- **Take nitroglycerin,** if prescribed. If you think you're having a heart attack and your doctor has previously prescribed nitroglycerin for you, take it as directed. Do not take anyone else's nitroglycerin, because that could put you in more danger.
- Begin CPR if the person is unconscious. If you're with a person who might be having a heart attack and he or she is unconscious, tell the 911 dispatcher or another emergency medical specialist. You may be advised to begin cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). If you haven't received CPR training, doctors recommend skipping mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing and performing only chest compressions (about 100 per minute). The dispatcher can instruct you in the proper procedures until help arrives.
- If an automated external defibrillator (AED) is available and the person is unconscious, begin CPR while the device is retrieved and set up. Attach the device and follow instructions that will be provided by the AED after it has evaluated the person's condition.

Help needed for Muskellunge tagging study

In order to understand the movements and behavior of Muskellunge and their associated fishery within the St. Clair-Detroit River System the Michigan Department of Natural Resources is launching a new study. The first step for this study begins this spring when a small number of Muskie (~20) will be tagged during the DNR's annual spring egg take in the Detroit River. Each fish will receive an internal acoustic tag which is automatically detected by listening stations deployed throughout the region. An ORANGE external FLOY tag will also be attached below the dorsal fin (see photos below). If you catch a tagged Muskie and plan to release it: please DO NOT remove the tag. Please record the tag number and contact Jan-Michael Hessenauer at (586) 465-4771 ext 35 or email: hessenaueri1@michigan.gov. If you harvest a tagged Muskie please remove the acoustic tag (approximate location shown below) and report the tag as per above. Reporting of tagged fish is greatly appreciated and will maximize the benefit of this study to the management of fisheries in the St. Clair-Detroit River System. Thank you!

MOMC Tales July 2013

An 18 year old tradition, the Michigan-Ontario Muskie Club (MOMC) along with the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club and Detroit Athletic Club continues the annual participation in the Special Olympics Muskie tournament raising money for the Grosse Pointe / Harper Wood Chapter of Special Olympics. Organizations like the Detroit Athletic Club, Detroit and Grosse Pointe Yacht Club along with other companies and individuals donate to fish aboard 47 different muskie boats during the one day and is a 100% Catch & Release Tournament with over 315 participants this year.

This day was not typical of others as a storm loomed the area just prior to the cannon shot start. As the boats raced to their muskie grounds, you could easily see there was no turning back. I was lucky to be a guest angler along with a few friends and Joel Piatek, first mate aboard the Yellow Belly, captained by Brad Horton who is a long time friend and fishing team mate. When Joel is not fishing with Brad he operates a full time charter business called FISH HEADZ Outfitter, a sport fishing and waterfowl guide service on LAKE ST. Clair. Together Brad and Joel have worked the SOM tournament for the last 6 years.

Heading across the lake to fish the Canadian side and having dark skies Joel is already beginning to think of today's lure selections. Darker colors mostly frog, perch and bass patterns on wooden baits such as Ziggies are generally the first picks to run on cloudy days. Adding a Spanky or Lapper Lure Bucktail is also a surefire way of adding a muskie to the catch report.

During the 9-3pm tournament, crews call into the MOMC weigh master to report the lengths of the fish they catch to place in the top 3 largest fish of the day. Once the fish is measured, it is released safely to ensure its survival and ultimately improve our fishery. Tremendous care is put into to releasing the fish that is caught since it ultimately ensures a better future fishery. One way of achieving a safe release is by using a system called, Fishthanks which is a livewell system created by Dave Clark, captain of Liquid Sedation. That has undoubtedly improved the survival of muskies caught on the lake. I believe it is the major reason we are catching muskies that top the 40lbs class. The Fishthanks system for us has kept fish alive for over 3 hours as they were taken in to be weighed and then back out again for safe release.

During this event we were using Shakespeare RP2 Tournament Rods with Shimano Tekota 700 reels spooled with Diamond 40lb test line at 9' with 60lb leaders for these toothy fish. Utilizing a main line planer board system with single releases off the boards, we vary our weights from 2-6 oz and line distance of 20-40' off the main planer line to enable us to fish different depths. Mostly we are focusing on the middle of the water column. From the boat we are running a down rod with a 10oz weight right off the back corner and 11' rods with a 4oz weight 20' back to fish the area just past the boat.

This day, the weeds and surface clutter is almost non-existent making for an easy day of running the rods, although the changing conditions had us firing through baits on a regular basis as we searched for the hot ticket to produce bites. A little slower in the morning hours, we only landed a few fish and nothing large. It wasn't until the storm front blew through, when the humidity and temperature started to climb when we had our best bites producing 6 fish in the final few hours of tournament.

Most of our fish during that time came on Ziggie bass patterns and olive frog. Its essential that you continue to search for the colors that are best suited for the given weather. What worked an hour ago, may not be producing now. I like to blend the bait with the water and sticking to more natural color patterns. Finally, keeping rods clean of weeds is essential, so stay vigilant on the rods because no self respecting muskie will take a bait that is pulling weeds. Keep your lines clean, run them around 3.8mph and switch them up to find the color patterns working for that day and you are doing the right things that will produce muskies on Lake St. Clair. It was a fun day and we pulled in a good dozen, all of good size just no prize winners. The results are as follows:

- 1st Capt Jim McCardy (GPYC) Team After-All
- 53"length Successfully Released.
- 2nd Capt Scott Murray (MOMC) Team Down Time
- 52" length Successfully Released.
- 3rd Capt Vince Brennan (MOMC) Team Mary Megan II
- 51 1/4" length Successfully Released.

Keep the Lake Clean



Aquatic Hitchhikers



Invasive aquatic animals and plants are spreading at alarming rates by hitching rides with anglers and boaters. Whenever boaters leave a body of water without cleaning their recreational equipment, they may

An those cleaning boat property An those

be transporting one of these harmful creatures from one lake or stream to another. A few invasive species are highlighted in this brochure.

ROUND GOBIES are bottom-dwelling fish that compete with native fish, like sculpins and log perch. They're also aggressive egg predators –

feeding on the eggs of other fish, such as smallmouth bass and walleye,



contributing to the potential decline of many valuable sport fish populations.

ASIAN CARP, including the highjumping silver carp and the voracious bighead carp, pose a serious threat to native species.



Canals and other connections to the Mississippi River Basin could allow Asian carp into the Great Lakes. Boaters and anglers can do their part to avoid accidentally transporting carp eggs, larvae, and young in bilge water, livewells or bait buckets. ZEBRA and QUAGGA MUSSELS feed extensively on algae and plankton, thereby disrupting the delicate balance of the entire aquatic ecosystem.

Just because they make the water clearer by eating plankton doesn't mean they're good for lakes! In addition to changing the food web, the filter-feeding invasives build up contaminants in their bodies, which

in turn, exposes other animals to higher levels of contaminants. They

have been known to attach onto and kill native species of mussels. While zebra mussels can colonize any hard object, quagga mussels are far more versatile. They can live in colder, deeper water and thrive on a sandy lake bottom.

EURASIAN WATERMILFOIL, PHRAGMITES AUSTRALIS and PURPLE LOOSESTRIFE are invasive aquatic plants that also endanger our waters and wetlands. While they may look harmless, these plants can crowd out native plants and take over large areas quickly. Milfoil, a submerged

plant, often gets wrapped around boat propellers. It's important to clean plants like Eurasian watermilfoil off of your boat and trailer because they can reproduce in new areas from a strand as little as two inches long.



Found Something Strange?

The Great Lakes Aquatic Non-indigenous Species Information System (GLANSIS) website is your one-stop portal for Great Lakes invaders. If you find an invasive species while boating or fishing, check GLANSIS first for:

- Identification information to verify if it is a native or non-native species.
- Fact sheets about invasive species impacts.
- Collection details: has this species been documented before in this body of water?
- Link to a reporting form to help scientists track the spread of aquatic non-native species.
